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

News Release: Lott Reappointed to Eastern Oklahoma State College Board of Regents

WILBURTON, Oklahoma — Brian D. Lott of McAlester has been reappointed by Governor Kevin Stitt to serve another seven-year term on the Eastern Oklahoma State College Board of Regents. The appointment, made on March 31, 2025, will extend Lott's service from June 2, 2025, through June 1, 2032. He is replacing himself on the college's governing board.

Senator Warren Hamilton carried Lott's nomination to the Senate Education Committee, which confirmed the reappointment during its meeting on May 6, 2025.

Lott currently serves as the Deputy to the Commander at the McAlester Army Ammunition Plant, a position he has held since February 2019. In this role, he is responsible for overseeing the plant's mission programs, safety, security, infrastructure and strategic planning to ensure effective operations.

Prior to this role, Lott served as Chief of Staff at MCAAP, where he directed key functions such as risk management, logistics, quality assurance, public affairs, and environmental management. He began his civil service career in 1991 as a student employee and has since held numerous leadership positions over more than three decades at the facility.

Lott earned a Bachelor of Science in Business and Elementary Education from Southeastern Oklahoma State University and an MBA from Cameron University. He is a graduate of the Depot and Arsenal Executive Leadership Program through the Institute for Defense and Business and the University of North Carolina's Kenan-Flagler Business School. He also completed Leadership Oklahoma as a member of Class 31.

In addition to his service at Eastern, Lott is in his 21st year as a member of the Frink-Chambers Public Schools Board of Education.

"It's an incredible honor to continue serving Eastern Oklahoma State College," Lott said. "I believe strongly in the mission of community colleges and the life-changing opportunities Eastern provides to students across

our region. I look forward to supporting that mission in the years ahead."

The Eastern Board of Regents is composed of seven members appointed by the governor with the advice and consent of the Oklahoma Senate. Other current members include Chair Leland Walker of Red Oak, Secretary Larry Spradley of Howe, Latt Jeffrey of Wilburton, Cara Bland of McAlester, Eric Bilderback of El Reno, and Jerry Hamilton of Indianola.

News Release: Eastern to Host Fifth Native Americans Who Code Summer Camp

WILBURTON, Oklahoma — Eastern Oklahoma State College will host its fifth Native Americans Who Code summer camp May 27-29, 2025.

Students from local schools will participate in a camp designed to spark interest in coding, computer science, engineering, and robotics. The camp is for incoming 5th-12th grade students and will meet from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. Lunch will be provided. There is no cost to attend and space is limited. Register online by May 16, 2025.

The Native Americans Who Code summer camp will be designed and led by Eastern faculty members Brenda Strange and Kellye Semeski with assistance by Laura Clark and Karren Majors. The camp is funded by Eastern's \$1.5 million NASNTI grant and is modeled on the Girls Who Code program.

News Release: Fugitt Foundation Donates Additional Funds to EOSC, Total Giving Reaches \$900,000

WILBURTON, Oklahoma — Eastern Oklahoma State College has received a new donation from the Fugitt Foundation to support the Fugitt Health Sciences Fund, bringing the foundation's total contributions to the college to \$900,000. This continued investment will further enhance healthcare education and workforce development across Eastern's service area.

The most recent gift of \$300,000 will be used to support the faculty and students in the college's various health-related programs.

"The great leadership of [EOSC President] Dr. [Janet] Wansick made Eastern an obvious choice for our continued support," said Tim Diehl, Fugitt Foundation trustee. "Her vision for healthcare education and workforce development aligns perfectly with our mission to invest in lasting, meaningful change in Southeastern Oklahoma."

Wansick emphasized how essential local partnerships are to the college's mission and long-term sustainability.



The continued support of the Fugitt Foundation reinforces Eastern's role as a leader in preparing compassionate, competent health-care professionals throughout the region.



News Release: EOSC Baseball Claims Region 2 Title, Advances in Postseason



WILBURTON, Oklahoma — Eastern Oklahoma State College is headed to the South Central District Championship after capturing the NJCAA Region 2 Baseball Tournament title this past weekend in Seminole, Okla.

The Mountaineers posted a 3-1 record in the tournament, including two key victories over Connors State College, to clinch their first regional championship since 2022. With the title, Eastern improved to 29-24 on the season and earned a spot in a best-of-three series against Mineral Area College, set to begin Thursday, May 15, at 2 p.m. in Park Hills, Mo. The winner will advance to the NJCAA World Series.

Sophomore pitcher Grayson Connell played a pivotal role in Eastern's run, delivering two standout performances against Connors State. Over 13 1/3 innings, Connell allowed just two earned runs while striking out 12 and walking four.

"Only winning 13 games last year with six of them being in conference was the motivation to work hard to come back to try to win the region tournament," Connell said. "We had a lot of players return from last year's team and that made winning this regional special. We went out and showed that we wanted it the most."

Second-year head coach Dru Sebastian credited his team's toughness and resilience throughout the season and postseason.

"This team has been battle tested from opening day through this regional tournament," Sebastian said. "They have been in close games and in every situation imaginable. They have learned how to win close games and thrive in big moments."

Eastern's Region 2 Championship marks a major milestone in Sebastian's rebuilding efforts, as the program looks to make its first appearance at the NJCAA World Series in 24 years.

"I am proud of this sophomore class for the adversity they have gone through," Sebastian said. "We have added some key pieces to a roster that was hungry for success. This team has worked hard on and off the field to compete in big games at the end of the season. All of their success has been earned by learning from past failure, and cannot have been accomplished without their mental and physical fortitude."

News Release: Dr. Randy Harp Appointed as Next President of Eastern Oklahoma State College

WILBURTON, Oklahoma — The Eastern Oklahoma State College Board of Regents has named Dr. Randy Harp as the 21st president in the institution's 117-year history. Harp currently serves as Eastern's Vice President for Academics and Development and will officially assume the presidency on July 1, 2025.

With more than four decades of experience in higher education and a 16-year history of service to Eastern, Harp is a seasoned leader in academics, development, and student success. He previously served as Dean of the College of Agricultural Sciences and Natural Resources at Texas A&M University-Commerce and held faculty and leadership roles at Tarleton State University.

"I am truly honored to be selected as the next president of Eastern Oklahoma State College," Harp said. "Eastern has played a significant role in my career and my life. I look forward to working collaboratively with students, faculty, staff, and the community to continue building on Eastern's strong legacy of providing opportunity and excellence in higher education."

Leland Walker, chairman of the EOSC Board of Regents, said the board interviewed several candidates, but Harp's leadership experience, history with, and personal connections to, Eastern stood out.

"We are pleased and excited to welcome Dr. Randy Harp as Eastern's 21st president," Walker said. "Dr. Harp has a long association with Eastern Oklahoma State College, having served as a faculty member and department head between 1984 and 1999. He brings a wealth of experience from the community college and university levels in the areas of instruction, administration, fundraising, and network development. Dr. Harp returned to Eastern in the fall of 2024, as the vice president of academic affairs and will begin his term as president following the retirement of Dr. Janet Wansick. We extend a warm welcome to Dr. Harp and his wife Dana and wish Dr. Wansick the best as she begins a new chapter."

Harp began his academic career as an instructor at East Texas State University in 1979 before becoming an instructor and department head at Eastern in 1984, where he helped triple enrollment in the agriculture department and established lasting ties within the Wilburton community. He later led academic programs at Tarleton State and Texas A&M-Commerce, where his



leadership resulted in significant enrollment increases, new academic initiatives, and scholarships and teaching support secured for students.

During his current stint at Eastern, Harp has served as executive director of the development foundation and interim dean of agriculture, in addition to his vice president role.

The son of two educators, Harp earned his doctoral degree in agricultural education and higher education administration from Oklahoma State University, a master's degree in animal science from New Mexico State University, and a bachelor's degree in animal science from OSU. He will succeed Wansick, who announced her retirement earlier this year after five years of service as Eastern's first female president.

"It has been an honor to serve as president of this institution and I want to extend my congratulations to Dr. Harp on his appointment as the next president of Eastern Oklahoma State College," Wansick said. "I hope he will continue the strong trajectory of growth the institution has experienced in recent years and remain dedicated to expanding student access and success across all programs. I look forward to seeing the college's progress in the years ahead and wish the faculty, staff, and students continued success."

News Release: Eastern Oklahoma State College Baseball Wins South Central District Title, Advances to JUCO World Series for First Time Since 2001

WILBURTON, Oklahoma — For the first time in 24 years, the Eastern Oklahoma State College baseball team is headed to the NJCAA Division I JUCO World Series.

The Mountaineers clinched the South Central District Championship with a 6-3 victory over Mineral Area College on May 16, capping a best-of-three series that showcased the team's resilience and offensive fire-power. The win sends Eastern to the prestigious national tournament in Grand Junction, Colorado, marking the program's second-ever appearance and its first since 2001.

"I couldn't be prouder of these guys," Head Coach Dru Sebastian said. "They've battled all season long, and to punch our ticket to the Grand Junction is a dream come true for this group. It's been a long time coming for Fastern."

After dropping the opening game of the series 5-3 on Thursday afternoon, Eastern responded later that evening with a thrilling 8-6 win, sparked by a seven-run sixth inning. Sophomore catcher Kahne Nolen drove in two runs, while first baseman Ruben Venter collected three hits and two RBIs. Joe Victery added a solo home run, and Grayson Connell earned the win in relief with 3.2 innings of solid work to close the door on Mineral Area's comeback attempt.

In the deciding game on Friday, Eastern jumped out early and never looked back. Venter set the tone with a crucial three-run homer in the first inning. Shortstop Jack Runsick led the offense, going 4-for-5 with three RBIs. Diego Rodriguez earned the win in relief with 3.1 scoreless innings. Venter also made the game-winning 3-6 double play to punch the Mountaineers' ticket to the World Series.

"Being able to win district with this team means everything to me," Venter said. "The adversity this group has gone through and being able to lean on each other in tough moments is everything. Making key plays on both sides of the ball is something I've visualized throughout



the course of the season and I'm glad I could come through for the guys. From setting the tone of the game with the home run, to ending the game with the double play, there's no better feeling than getting the win to go to Junction."

The Mountaineers finish the district tournament with a 31-25 record, riding a wave of momentum into the JUCO World Series. The 2025 squad has captured the imagination of the college and local community, rekindling a proud tradition of Mountaineer baseball.

"Our entire athletic department, campus, and community are incredibly proud of Coach Sebastian and the team for their postseason success," said Athletic Director and Head Softball Coach Kendra Whisenhunt. "They've overcome numerous challenges and demonstrated remarkable unity and resilience throughout the season. We are excited to see our baseball program headed to the NJCAA World Series for the first time since 2001 and we can't wait to cheer for them in Grand Junction."

Eastern earned the No. 10 seed in the tournament and will now prepare for its first-round matchup with No. 1 seeded Walters State Community College on Saturday, May 24, at 1 p.m. CDT. All tournament games can be streamed on ESPN+.



News Release: Eastern Student-Athletes Honored with 57th Annual Larry Stone Awards

WILBURTON, Oklahoma — For the past 57 years, Eastern Oklahoma State College has honored the legacy of a former two-sport athlete and Marine lieutenant who died in combat while on patrol in Vietnam, the late Larry Stone of Jay, Okla.

Stone played football and baseball at Eastern in the early 1960s and was known for his selfless attitude and commitment to his team. It is this lasting impression that prompted a group of his former college teammates and classmates to honor his legacy by presenting the annual Larry Stone Award to one male and one female student-athlete who exemplifies the same characteristics. A memorial scholarship is also awarded to two student-athletes who will return to Eastern for their sophomore years.

Eastern sophomores Geralyn Haney and Jack Runsick were selected for the 2025 Larry Stone Award on the basis of their overall contributions to the spirit of athletics and their demonstration of teamwork, determination, unselfishness and citizenship. Melanie Richard and Jude Hill each received the Larry Stone Memorial Scholarship.

Haney is a softball player from Stuart, Okla. She graduated with a degree in mass communication and carried a 4.0 GPA during her time at Eastern. She was a vital contributor to the Lady Mountaineer softball team was named to the NJCAA Region 2 All-Region 2nd Team. Haney will continue her academic career at Southeastern Oklahoma State University next year.

"Geralyn Haney is the athlete that every coach wants on their team, the student that every professor wants in the classroom, and just an all-around great person," said Head Softball Coach and Athletic Director Kendra Whisenhunt. "She has excelled in the classroom, graduating with a 4.0 in mass communication, and was named the Outstanding Graduate in that department. Athletically, Geralyn leads by example and is always putting the team first and steps up in big moments. She has shined in the outfield for us both years and is a reliable bat in the lineup. She embodies the characteris-

tics of Larry Stone by her selfless dedication to her team and community."

Runsick is a baseball player from Greenbrier, Ark. He graduated with a degree in general studies and earned a 3.94 GPA. Runsick was an important contributor in the Mountaineer lineup and was named to the NJCAA Region 2 All-Region 1st Team.

"Jack Runsick battled through injury his first year at Eastern.," said Head Baseball Coach Dru Sebastian. "He came back to become a 1st team All-Region 2 performer while maintaining a 3.94 GPA heading into graduation. Jack demonstrated resiliency and mental fortitude during his time at Eastern as a leader on and off the field."

Richard is a women's soccer player from Union Ti Morne, Saint Lucia. She is majoring in psychology and sociology and earned a 3.7 GPA through her first year at Eastern.

"Melanie has been a true leader not only on the soccer field but in the classroom," said Head Soccer Coach Jake Cottage. "She leads by example with her brilliant work ethic and positive attitude. Melanie will be a big player for us next season and we look forward to seeing her grow as a person and soccer player."

Hill is a men's basketball player from Oklahoma City. He is majoring in general studies and earned a 4.0 GPA through his first year at Eastern.

"Jude encapsulates what the Larry Stone award is all about," said Head Men's Basketball Coach Tim Miser. "Jude is always going to do what is right and do it to the best of his ability. He is a true leader by his example, not only on the court, but in the classroom and in the community. He is a joy to be around and is always trying to better those around him."





What is your favorite thing about working at Eastern or your favorite memory?






Besides getting to work with some amazing musicians, I love teaching Music in Life. I get to interact with a variety of students and impart my love of music to them.
